

Creating worlds where passions can be explored

The VCE's new Vocational Major lets students explore their passions and talents.

The VCE Vocational Major is a 2-year applied learning program within the VCE and includes 180 hours of Vocational Education and Training (VET), so students obtain real-world skills and knowledge to one day land a job in Australia's most in-demand industries.

Whether they're into music production, hospitality or agriculture, VCE Vocational Major students finish school with an employability edge, ready to take on work, life and more study. Students complete a high-quality curriculum, and work toward completing a VET qualification while finishing school.

The Victorian Pathways Certificate is a new flexible Year 11 and 12 course designed for the small number of students who, for a range of reasons, are not able or ready to undertake the VCE or the VCE Vocational Major in schools.

Teachers and career counsellors are available to answer questions, and to support students as they make decisions about their final years at school.

Vocational Major

Structured Workplace Learning

Structured workplace learning (SWL) provides students with the opportunity to integrate on-the-job experience with secondary study as part of the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) and the VCE Vocational Major. Every Vocational Major student at Gladstone Park Secondary College is required to complete at least one day of SWL each week. Students complete their SWL at a range of different workplaces.

I learnt how to put a halter on a horse, how to properly feed them, put rugs on them, how to put saddles on and how to properly catch them and safely put them in a paddock. Overt time I had less supervision. Since I have shown I was comfortable, independent and was respectful towards everyone there they offered me a casual position 3 weeks into my work placement.






Intermediate Sport



Year 11 Legal Studies Excursion

On Wednesday, the 8th of May, Miss Li's Year 11 Legal Studies class visited The Supreme Court of Victoria.

The class met in front of one of the multiple entries to the large court. Victoria's Supreme Court Trial Division, established in 1852, holds a famed legacy as one of Australia's oldest courts, overseeing cases that shape legal precedents for all of the courts below it. We had the privilege of touring courtroom 1, one of the original foundations of the Supreme Court, alongside courtroom 4. We learned that these rooms are where new solicitors and judges are admitted, and departing judges are bid farewell. We were shown specific parts of the grand rooms, including the judge's and their associates' bench, witness box, bar table, dock, and public gallery.

Students were then met by Her Honour Patricia Matthews, a civil (commercial) Justice, and her associates Kit and Amelia, who provided views into the day-to-day requirements of their positions. After generously addressing the inquiries of both students and teachers, they stepped aside to afford the students an opportunity to observe a preliminary hearing for a criminal case. This special access provided us with firsthand perspective into courtroom proceedings and operational protocols, such as standing when a judge enters and bowing when one must leave.

Students were then dismissed from the Supreme Court for an hour to enjoy lunch in the CBD. Upon return, we were then sent off on a scavenger hunt to visit locations such as all the courts in the Victorian court hierarchy (Magistrates', County, and Supreme), the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT), the Owen Dixon Chambers, etc. Once we had photographed our groups in front of each location, we rushed to Federation Square, where our teachers patiently waited with a prize for the winning group. Students were then dismissed, sent home with a wonderful insight into our legal system.

A huge thank you to Miss Li for organising this trip, ensuring that students both underwent a learning opportunity whilst having fun simultaneously, and to Mr. Anfuso for helping on the day, providing interesting insights on this excursion. Thank you also to Miss Jessica Powell for accompanying us on the day. Our excursion to the Supreme Court not only enriched our understanding as students, but also showed us the intricacies of our justice system in a profound and unforgettable manner, leaving us inspired to delve deeper into the complexities of law and society.

The Year 10s-12s visited the Victorian Career Show at the Melbourne Showgrounds on 16-17 May 2024. This event was designed to get Year 10 students thinking about their future career and educational pathways. Year 11 and 12 students got to obtain more in depth information on University courses, TAFE pathways and apprenticeship options.

One benefit of the event was the expert seminars (including Chemistry, English, Methods and Physics) to provide students with study and exam tips.

The Australian Defence Force had a huge presence at the fair and had lots of touchpoints for students to try. From trying on battle vests and mini-golf to rowing competitions and virtual reality missions. Also present were Ambulance Victoria and the Poiice. Students also had the opportunity to have an up-close look at military equipment and tactical vehicles and discover how a hot air balloon works.

Students were able to have one-on-one chats with university representatives and find out the pre-requisites for different courses and get information on early-entry programs for respective universities. Australian Catholic University, La Trobe University, RMIT and University of Melbourne were present. Kangan TAFE, the Gordon TAFE and other educational institutions like Australian Institute of Music, Collarts, JMC, and The Photography Institute were also present to promote their industry specific courses. Victoria University and Torrens University were also present to promote their no-ATAR courses.





The Parliament Prize - 2024

What would you say to Parliament if you were an MP?

During sitting weeks, Members of Parliament (MPs) get the opportunity to make statements on matters of interest and concern to them. Often that includes matters arising in their electorates that they wish to bring to the attention of Parliament, for example, achievements of people or organisations in their electorate, challenges being faced in their local community, or perhaps broader state or national issues. The maximum time allowed for such statements is 90 seconds per member. You can see what members speak about during Members' Statements by looking at Hansard, which is the record of what is said in Parliament.

Each year, the Parliament of Victoria asks students across the state, from Grade 5 to Year 12, to share what they would say to parliament if they were an MP. This is a chance to talk about the issues that are important to you and your community. Record your own 90-second Member's Statement video and you could win prizes, for you and the school!

The competition is open to three categories: Grades 5 and 6; Years 7 to 9; and Years 10 to 12.

A prize of \$500 and a commemorative trophy will be awarded to the first-placed entry in each category. There will also be prizes of \$250 to the second-placed entries and \$125 to the third-placed entries in each age group.

Submissions close on Friday, 14 June 2024 by 5PM.



What do you need to do?

What do we do?

Smile Patrol offers free dental care checks and necessary general treatments to eligible students at school during regular hours through our mobile dental service. Students who qualify under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) can receive various dental treatments, including tooth cleaning, x-rays, fissure sealants, and fluoride application tailored to their specific needs. For a detailed understanding of these treatments, please refer to the dental treatment guide on the next page. Once a check up has been done we will email you a dental treatment care plan.

*(Free - if eligible under the CDBS, Non eligible students will have an option of having treatment that does incur private costs)

What are Dental Treatment Care Plans?

We'll provide you with a dental care plan that outlines the treatment your child received and any additional recommendations, if necessary. This plan will help you stay informed about your child's dental care and guide you on any further steps that may be needed. The plan will be emailed to the email address you provided in the online consent form.

Follow up:

If follow up treatment is needed, we will contact you to obtain informed consent and make recommendations. You are free to follow up with us or with your own dentist.

Do parents, legal guardians, or carers need to attend a student's appointment?

Parents, legal guardians, or carers are welcome to accompany their child during the appointment if they wish. If additional treatment is required, we may request the presence of a parent, legal guardian, or carer during the appointment to ensure clear communication and support.



Have your medicare card handy, it only takes 5mins

What if a student has received recent dental treatment?

If a student has recently had dental care, they can still be seen by Smile Patrol. Depending on their individual needs, they may not require x-rays or other preventive services.

Smile Patrol can become the student's regular dental provider, visiting your school annually and more frequently for those students who require it.

Missed the Dental Visit? Don't Worry, We've Got You Covered!

If your child could not be seen on the scheduled day but you still want them to have a check-up, feel free to reach out to us. If we are still at your school, we may be able to arrange another appointment on a different day. In case that doesn't work, we can gladly book your child at our dental clinic in Preston for a convenient visit. We're here to ensure your child receives the dental care they need, even if plans change. Free checkups cannot be guaranteed unless your child is eligible under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS).

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING THE CHILD DENTAL BENEFITS SCHEDULE:

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) offers eligible children aged 0-17 years funding of \$1,052 for preventative dental treatment. This is renewed every 2 calendar years. This service is covered by Medicare, meaning you do not have to pay for it. To learn more, visit

https://www.servicesaustralia.gov.au/child-dental-benefits-schedule. You can also check your child's eligibility and CDBS balance through your Medicare online account at myGov, or by calling 132 011.

Smile Patrol will verify your child's eligibility before treatment. Upon an initial examination (88011), the Medicare amounts for each service we may provide are in the table below including Medicare pricing for fissure seals.

Please note that this is a general guide, and for detailed information about your specific situation and services covered, it is advisable to consult with Smile Patrol or visit our website. If there are treatments needed that are not covered we will inform you in the treatment plan so you can follow up with us or your preferred dentist.

What dental treatments will be provided and what do they mean?

Dental check-ups or examinations:

A child's dental check-up is an important visit where the dentist examines the child's teeth, gums, and mouth for any issues. It's crucial for parents to prioritize these visits to ensure their child's oral health and prevent dental problems.

Risks: None

X-Rays of teeth:

Dental x-rays are essential for children's oral health, as they help dentists detect tooth decay, evaluate tooth development, identify alignment issues, and create personalized treatment plans.

Risks: Dental x-rays are very safe, with significantly lower radiation levels compared to everyday sources like background radiation, medical diagnostic procedures, and air travel. The controlled doses and protective measures in dental x-rays ensure that the benefits outweigh the minimal radiation risk.

Fluoride application:

Fluoride application to children's teeth is important as it helps strengthen tooth enamel, making it more resistant to decay. It also helps prevent cavities and promotes overall dental health, ensuring children have a strong foundation for lifelong oral well-being. **Risks:** Allergies to fluoride are exceptionally rare. However, if the child has allergies to band-aids, rosin, or casein (milk protein), fluoride application may not be possible.

Fissure Sealants

Fissure sealants are important for children's teeth as they protect against cavities by creating a barrier that prevents food and bacteria from getting trapped.

Risks: Allergy to fissure sealants

Tooth Cleaning:

A dental scale and clean involves a thorough cleaning by a dentist to make teeth sparkle and feel fresh. Special tools are used to remove plaque build-up and tartar including those hard-to-reach areas. It's a deep cleaning that promotes dental health and keeps your children's smile shining bright!

Risks: Minimal risk, slight gum trauma or bleeding.
